Introducing Limerick Lifelong Learning Festival 2025

Preparations for the next Limerick Learning Lifelong Festival are well in place; this will be the 15th annual festival and runs from Monday 7th April to Sunday 13th April. The festival will be launched at an official event in Newcastle West Library.

Feeback on Our Festival Last Year

The Limerick Lifelong Learning Festival 2024 took place from Monday 15th April to Sunday 21st April 2024 and was a great success. The festival's theme was 'Learn, Grow, Explore in 2024'. There were over 150 free events to choose from featuring activities such as community arts, wellbeing, guided tours, open days, education pathways, professional and personal development, language tasters, technology, cookery classes, business and enterprise. The festival was launched at a special event held at the College of Further Education and Training, Mulgrave Street Campus, on the 22nd of March. There was also a festival flagship event called 'Creativity for Wellbeing – A celebration of Lifelong Learning' that was held at the Abundant Life Centre on April 18th. Learning Limerick remains committed to supporting, promoting, and improving lifelong learning across the city and county. Overall, 2024 was a fulfilling, successful and busy year for Learning Limerick, while also providing us with some clear directions for our ongoing future work in 2025. We also look forward to commencing the process of drafting our new Strategic Plan for our group later in 2025.

Networking Meeting Held in October 2024



A successful 'Wellness Learning Journey' event we had last October 9th, 2024, at Moyross Community Enterprise Centre Ltd. The guest speaker psychotherapist Caroline Crotty; shared some tips on self-care and mental health. This event was hosted by Learning Limerick in collaboration with Limerick Mental Health Association as part of Limerick Mental Health Week. A number of topics that the speaker Caroline Crotty covered were Finding Balance in Learning, Living with Mindfulness, The Comparison Trap, Incorporating Downtime, and The Role of Community and Connection.

Learning Limerick Information and Networking Event - January 2025

A productive Learning Limerick Information and Networking meeting was held on Friday 31st January in Castletroy Park Hotel hosted by the Festival Organizing Committee. Tom Kent, Regional Literacy Coordinator, Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board, was the keynote speaker, explaining this year's festival theme based on literacy. Tom also shared some information on the seminar taking place during the festival week entitled "All Literacies Change Lives".



The Learning Limerick Chairperson, Eimear Brophy, Limerick and Clare ETB gave an insightful address on the importance of lifelong learning in a global context, the need to decipher fake news and propaganda and the importance of upskilling on key literacies.

Jim Prior, Limerick Community Education Network, facilitated the event in collaboration with Helen Brown, University of Limerick.

LCEN 30 Year Celebration and Launch of Impact Review – 23rd October 2024

Limerick Community Education Network (LCEN) marked 30 years of the network at a special celebratory event held on 23rd October 2024. This event was combined with the launch of its Impact Review and marked a commitment from all partners to the support and provision of education in communities across Limerick City. LCEN, a key community partner of Learning Limerick, is a city-wide network of community and voluntary groups, and statutory agencies involved in the organization and delivery of community education in Limerick.



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Recommendations arising from the Impact Review found that LCEN has key strengths but there are also areas for further growth development. It outlined enhanced communication, secure funding, and strengthening of partnerships as some areas for further growth. With these changes, and by working together with its partners, LCEN can continue making a positive impact on Limerick.

Irish Network of Learning Cities and UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities

The Irish Network of Learning Cities had a busy year, continuing with biweekly meetings for the coordinators, as a vital support mechanism, to share best practice and ideas. For Irish Learning Cities Day on 26th September, there was a collaborative video created with the six mayors of all six cities speaking about the benefits of being part of the network. Learning Limerick's Lifelong Learning Facilitator also travelled to Cork for Irish Learning Cities Day, for a workshop on Learning Neighborhoods and attended the launch of the Cork Celebrates Lifelong Learning Awards. There was a workshop meeting facilitated by Dublin Learning City on December 11th, where the six cities coordinated collaborative plans and actions for the year ahead.



The sixth International UNESCO Learning Cities Conference was held in Jubail, Saudi Arabia from 3rd – 5th December. In preparation for this conference, UNESCO facilitated an online webinar meeting for the European and North American Network of Learning Cities on October 9th. Yvonne Lane, Learning Limerick Coordinator, presented the work of the Irish Network of Learning Cities.

A group from Learning Limerick met with Katja Roemer from the UNESCO Institute of Lifelong Learning in Cork last year. This was part of a shared island event; and the Limerick Mental Health Association representative lan Hackett presented on their 'Buddy Bench' project at the international seminar.



TUS Midwest Access Service & Flexible Learning Dept Nominated for AONTAS Star Awards

The Certificate in Transition to Higher Education in TUS Midwest has been shortlisted for the AONTAS Star awards this year under the Third Level Access and Engagement category.
